
Feminism In Lysistrata And In Eve

Lysistrata and Eve both play pivotal roles in greek history as well as in the Hebrew Bible. They showcase the power that women have while defying gender roles and protecting those they love the most. In the bible Eve is one of the most well-known characters for her story in Genesis. Whereas Lystrata is known for her story where she empowers the women of Greece to withhold sex in order to bring peace to an entire city-state. In the text the women call it "Lysistrata May gentle Love and the sweet Cyprian Queen shower seductive charms on our bosoms and all our personnel. If only we may stir so amorous feeling among the men that they stand firm as sticks, we shall indeed deserve the name of peace-makers among the Greeks." (? Aristophanes, Lysistrata) Lysistrata literary uses her sexual appeal to take down an entire army, and does not blink twice about doing it. Lysistrata enforces her plans and doesn't stray away for a second. Even when the commissioner threatens to have all the women arrested and tries to burn them out of the building Lysistrata stands strong with the women. Lysistrata explains to the Commissioner that war is a concern of women because women have sacrificed so much for it, including their husbands and sons. "What matters that I was born a woman, if I can cure your misfortunes? I pay my share of tolls and taxes, by giving men to the State. But you, you miserable greybeards, you contribute nothing to the public charges; on the contrary, you have wasted the treasure of our forefathers, as it was called, the treasure amassed in the days of the Persian Wars. You pay nothing at all in return, and into the bargain you endanger our lives and liberties by your mistakes. Have you one word to say for yourselves?... Ah! don't irritate me, you there, or I'll lay my slipper across your jaws; and it's pretty heavy." (? Aristophanes, Lysistrata) Demonstrating how far Lysistrata and the women will go in order to protect the ones they love. It makes the reader really appreciate the women and what they did.

Eve is probably the best-known character in the entire bible. Her story had a large impact of the gender specific roles of women in that century. According to the bible Eve represents all women and is "the mother of mankind". However, due to her act in the garden the repercussions are much greater. Demonstrated In 1 Timothy 2: 11-12 "Let the woman learn in silence with all submission. And I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man, but to be in silence." forwards an interpretation that women should not be seen speaking, teaching, or speaking for themselves in church.
