He believes he is better than other people when he's not. Dogberry uses malapropisms throughout the play to say he's smart. "First, who think you the most desartless man to be constable?" He says 'desartless' but he actually means 'deserving'. Deception can actually be good which is established by Don Pedro and all of his schemes. All of us can relate to Deception and Self-Deception even if we were the target or the person performing it.
